presents the eastern outlier of a mallec-adapted stock from the southwest of the continent". Further evidence to support this would also support ruficeps as a good species.—A. McE.

WOOD SANDPIPERS

To the Editor.

Sir,—In *The Emu*, vol. 57, p. 292, 1957, Julian R. Ford, with regard to a record of fourteen Wood Sandpipers (*Tringa glarcola*) from two miles east of Lake Gundaring, W.A., states—"It is of interest to note that this record constitutes the largest group of Wood Sandpipers seen in Australia."

I would like to point out that there are published records of considerably larger flocks. In my paper 'Recent Observations on South Australian Migratory Waders' (*The Emu*, vol. 54 pp. 51-57, 1954) I reported flocks of up to 29 Wood Sandpipers from the River Torrens Outlet Channel, Fulham, S.A.

In a later paper, 'Migratory Waders 1953-54', (The South Australian Ornithologist, vol. 21, p. 55, 1955), I reported flocks of up to 23, and probably of 35 Wood Sandpipers from the same locality. In the latter instance a flock of 35 sandpipers, probably all Wood Sandpipers, flushed after 23 Wood Sandpipers had been counted on the ground.

By way of interest, the maximum numbers of Wood Sandpipers recorded by me from the River Torrens Outlet Chan-

nel during subsequent seasons were—

1954-5—20 birds on November 6, 1954. 1955-6—at least 4 birds on March 1, 1956. 1956-7—16 birds on January 23, 1957.
