Australasian Publications

Palaeornithology

SCARLETT, R. J. 1967. A sub-fossil record of a Barn Owl in New Zealand. Notornis 14: 218-219.

Bones of Tyto alba, probably of the sub-species delicatula from Australia, are recorded from a sub-fossil deposit at Tom Bowling Beach, North--H.L.S. land.

Species

CARROLL, A. L. K. 1968. Foods of the Harrier. Notornis 15: 23-28. A study of the stomach contents of 124 Harriers Circus approximans showed their food to be predominantly birds, mammals and insects, occasionally frogs and fish. ---D.G.M.

FORDHAM, R. A. 1968. Dispersion and dispersal of the Dominican Gull

in Wellington, New Zealand. Proc. N.Z. ecol. Soc. 15: 40-50. The population, flocking habits and restricted dispersal in the area of Cook Strait are described as judged from banding and other techniques. -H.L.S.

HENDERSON, L. E. 1968. First record of the Emperor Penguin in New Zealand. Notornis 15: 34-35.

The first Emperor Penguin recorded in New Zealand was found alive on a beach near Invercargill on 5 April 1967.

KAIGLER, C. G. 1968. Red-necked Avocet in Westland. Notornis 15: 123. The first acceptable record of the sighting of an Australian Avocet in —D.G.M. New Zealand since 1912.

Economic ornithology and Conservation

CAITHNESS, T. A. 1968. Poisoning gulls with alpha-chloralose near a New Zealand airfield. J. Wildl. Mgmt 32: 279-286.

This records the killing by narcotic poison in 1965 of 85% of gulls breeding near an airfield. Ornithologists familiar with the behaviour of the individual Black-backed Gull will feel dismay at the size of the kill and sincerely hope that poisoning operations of this kind will be kept to a –H.L.S.

COLLETT, N. and HARRISON, D. L. 1968. Some observations on the effects of using organochlorine sprays in an orchard. N.Z. Jl Sci. 11:

Accumulated spray deposits over twelve years in a Christchurch orchard were apparently harmful to some insect-eating birds which fed in the orchard.

XV International Ornithological Congress

The dates for the Congress have been determined as follows:

The Hague: 30 August-5 September 1970 (inclusive). Congress Fee: Full Members—150 Dutch Guilders; Associate Members—100 Dutch Guilders.

Membership of the Congress is open to all ornithologists over the age of 18 years. Full members are entitled to attend all functions of the Congress and to receive the Proceedings. Wives, husbands and children over the age of 18 of full members can register as Associate Members at a reduced fee, which entitles them to attend all functions, but not to receive the

Proceedings. Restriction of the number of membership is not considered. After a formal opening on the Sunday evening, 30 August, the rest of the week will be devoted to scientific meetings. These will consist of Plenary Sessions in the mornings and Sectional Sessions in the afternoons. Some of the Plenary Sessions will have the character of a Symposium on well advanced or promising fields of ornithological research; at others recent advances in selected fields of ornithology will be reviewed. Forum discussions in the afternoon will give the opportunity to pay additional attention to the subjects treated in the morning. At the Sectional Sessions short offered papers will be read. Part of the afternoon sessions will be devoted to special or specialists' meetings. In addition there will be exhibits, a whole-day excursion on Wednesday and film shows in the evenings.

There will be ample opportunity for informal contacts, but no excursion

before or after the Congress will be organized.

The Congress will meet in the new buildings of the Netherlands Congress Centre, where all meals (except breakfast) will be served and where each night coffee shops and bars will be open. Accommodation will be arranged in hotels in the vicinity or on caravan or camping sites, if desired.
