CORRIGENDUM

In my paper, 'Comments on taxonomy and relationships in the parrot subfamilies Nestorinae, Loriinae and Platycercinae', Emu (1973) 73: 157–176, the new name 'Psittaculirostrinae' was proposed for the fig-parrots of the genus *Psittaculirostris*. I am grateful to Dr E. Mayr for pointing out to me that Article 40 of the International Code for Zoological Nomenclature reserves family-group names even if the name of the type-genus changes; thus Cyclopsittacinae is the correct name for this subfamily and Psittaculirestrinae should be synonymized with it. Throughout the paper I used the name 'Domicella' for the loriine genus Lorius; the latter name was restored by the International Commission on Zoological Nomenclature several years ago.
