FIFTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE RAOU NEST RECORD SCHEME

The return of cards for the 1978-79 season was outstanding in two respects: the number of cards returned (4,362) and the number of previously unrepresented species (24) added to the Scheme. The total number of cards submitted in 1978-79 is the highest since the Scheme began and reflects the increased effort by the many new participants of the previous year. The twenty-four species added to the collection came largely from northern Australian and offshore islands.

PARTICIPATION

Between 1 July 1978 and 30 June 1979, one hundred and four individuals joined the Scheme, now too numerous to list individually as in previous reports.

One hundred and fifteen individuals and two corporate bodies contributed to the Scheme and these are listed in Table I. Cards were also received from Atlas Camp-outs. The number of contributors and the average return per contributor have increased since last season. There are thirty-four more contributors this season and the average return per contributor has increased from thirty-five cards in 1977–78 to thirty-seven in 1978–79. Now that there is a solid core of contributors in the Scheme, it may be possible to direct the type and method of information collected. The spread of participants throughout Australia may allow nation-wide projects to be initiated, perhaps concentrating on the breeding of some species each season.

Breeding information from northern Australia, a highlight of the returns, was largely attributable to the efforts of J. McKean and W.R. Mason. A.K. Morris, N. Kurtz, A. Pritchard and P.S. Stone filled in many of the gaps in the cards for uncommon species. The larger contributions came from J. and P. Klapste (Elwood, Vic.), 467 cards; S. Marchant (Moruya, NSW), 316 cards; and R. and M. Brown (Manjimup, WA), 255 cards. As well as these outstanding contributions, all contributors deserve thanks for their time and effort throughout the season.

The total number of cards in the collection is now 35,157 and the annual totals are as follows:

During the year almost twenty individuals or organizations borrowed, or took data from, the cards of many species. This shows that the value of the Scheme is being more widely realized than before. At the same time it must be emphasized that there are barely a dozen species yet with enough cards (>500) for a proper analysis of the breeding of particular species.

Membership of the Scheme has doubled in the last two years and the Scheme ought to develop fruitfully in the years ahead. It is hoped to encourage as many people as possible to record nests after the Atlas is finished. Increased participation has been one of my primary aims during the past three years and I hope that the increased interest shown during this time will be maintained and that more emphasis will be placed on the analysis of data.

During the year I was helped by Dawn Cameron, who capably managed the Scheme for two months while I was away. I also wish to acknowledge the help given to me by Margaret Considine and Margaret Blakers at RAOU Headquarters. Finally, thanks must go to the participants who spend their time and effort finding and recording the information in the interests of Australian ornithology.

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
