Queensland

Annual state conference

The 1997 ICPAQ conference was held at the Sheraton Brisbane Hotel from 19-21 September 1997. This year, for the first time, ICPAQ joined with the Queensland Wound Care Association for a joint state conference. The ensuing meeting was very successful, with a program of papers that reflected both the common and distinct interests of the two groups. Over 250 delegates and 36 trade exhibitors attended, and the Sheraton provided a venue that was both elegant and informal. The theme of the conference was 'Vision to Action'. Delegates were warmly welcomed by Dolly Olesen, president of ICPAQ, who, drawing upon this theme, gave a strong and inspiring address, challenging the audience to create a vision and advance the mission of ICPAQ.

Keynote speaker Dr George Eliopoulos – Associate Professor of Medicine at Harvard Medical School and consultant in infectious diseases at Beth Israel Deaconess Hospital in Boston, USA – presented two papers, one on VRE and the other on Gram-negative bacteria.

There followed a very interesting and stimulating mix of presentations (approximately 25 in all) plus two challenging contests. The topics embraced a range of issues in infection control and wound care, with papers from nursing, medicine and the allied health professions. The first of the contests was a spirited challenge on the topics of surgical wound surveillance and standard precautions, with the second a debate



on the location of health care in the private sector. In both these forums, the presenters drew upon humour, science, policy and opinion to bring thought-provoking insights to the topics presented.

Congratulation to Dolly Olesen, Nancy Magazinovic and the committee, for a most successful and collegial conference.

State seminar

The annual seminar held in November was a great success, with a variety of new and practical topics being covered. Particular highlights were a look at forensic pathology (complete with gruesome visuals!), an entertaining presentation on the interpretation of pathology reports, and a very useful session on writing effective reports. This meeting was followed by our Christmas dinner, at historic Ayers House, and a good time was had by all!

ASM scientific conference

This year, the Australian Society for Microbiology held its annual scientific meeting, 'Festival of Microbes', in Adelaide and, for the first time, the organisers had arranged a day of presentations of particular interest to infection control practitioners. Those who were able to attend heard informative presentations by three key overseas speakers:

 Professor Brian Duerdon, Director of the PHLS, UK, spoke on the system of nosocomial infection surveillance operating in that country, at both central and regional levels;

- Associate Professor Ellen Jo Baron, from the UCLA Medical Centre, USA, discussed the role of the microbiologist in infection control, and
- Dr George Eliopoulos, also from the USA, gave an excellent overview of the problems associated with the emergence of vancomycin resistance in enterococci.

Other interesting presentations included the control of MRSA in Western Australia, the use of molecular typing techniques in the investigation of cross-infection problems within a neonatal intensive care unit, and an especially interesting paper on the use of hand-held computers for collecting data in the ward, the latter given by Dr David Looke from Princess Alexandra Hospital in Brisbane.

Video on handwashing

The staff development unit of the Royal Adelaide Hospital, in conjunction with the infection control unit, has produced an entertaining video. Designed to raise awareness of the importance of handwashing and aseptic technique in everyday clinical practice, it aims to promote discussion and change behaviour rather than teach these practices.


Membership survey

Tasmania: *Cynthia Bryce*

Cynthia has represented TICA, AICA and her colleagues with great integrity and energy during her 20-year career in infection control. She was the first infection control nurse (sepsis sister!) appointed in Tasmania, to the Royal Hobart Hospital in 1977, and undertook an infection control course at the then Lincoln Institute in 1978. Cynthia represented AICA at the Creutzfeldt Jacob international seminar.
