Dr Linda Bryant, Honorary Senior Lecturer, Department of General Practice & Primary Health Care, University of Auckland, Auckland

Linda is a pharmacist prescriber in primary care. She has lectured postgraduate pharmacist students in clinical pharmacy and has a broad interest in research. Research interests include the implementation of clinical services in general practice, collaboration, equity, and improving the use of pharmacotherapy, particularly pharmacogenomics.



Professor Jenny Carryer, Massey University, New Zealand and Executive Director of the New Zealand College of Nurses, Aotearoa (NZ).

Jenny Carryer is a professor of nursing at Massey University. She holds clinical postgraduate qualifications in oncology, cardiovascular nursing and counselling. She has extensive research and publication in the areas of primary health services, development of the nurse practitioner role and community based long-term condition management with over 100 peer-reviewed publications and extensive doctoral supervision. She is currently Co Chair of the NZ National Nurse Leaders Group.



Professor Peter Crampton, Kōhatu, Centre for Hauora Māori, University of Otago, Dunedin

Peter Crampton is a professor of public health in Kōhatu, the Centre for Hauora Māori, at the University of Otago. He researches and teaches Māori health, health systems and public health. His research is focused on social indicators and social epidemiology, health care policy, health care organisation and funding, and Māori health. He sits on the boards of the Health Quality and Safety Commission and the Southern District Health Board.



Professor Sue Crengle, Department of Preventive and Social Medicine, University of Otago, Dunedin

Sue Crengle is a senior Māori health researcher with a particular focus on health inequities, health services research and quality of care, and youth health. Lung cancer screening and cardiovascular disease are major foci of her work.



Associate Professor Ben Darlow, Department of Primary Health Care and General Practice, University of Otago Wellington.

Ben is an Associate Professor in the Department of Primary Health Care and General Practice at the University of Otago Wellington and a Musculoskeletal Physiotherapy Specialist working in private practice in Wellington.
