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The White Goshawk in South Australia.—A fine adult specimen of this bird, Astur novæ-hollandiæ, was forwarded to the South Australian Museum by Mr. B. McKenzie of Fulham Park, where it had been harassing the poultryyard of his father on April 5, 1949. The collector remarked that at first sight it was thought to be a White Cockatoo, and that the bird was extremely wary. Details of specimen: no. B23888; sex, female; iris, cere, legs and feet, yellow; talons and bill, black. As far as is known this is the only skin of the white phase of this species from South Australia in Australian collections, although it has been reported previously.-H. T. Condon, South Australian Museum, Adelaide, S.A., 14/10/49.
