Mr. J. H. Reed, R.A.O.U., has written advising of the recent observation by him also of Grey-tailed Tattlers (*Tringa brevipes*) at Mud Island, Victoria, confirming the record contained in *The Emu*, Vol. XXXII, p. 294 (296).

Members obtaining books from the library are requested to return them as soon as possible. The fact that certain books had been out on loan for some considerable time necessitated at least three attendances at the Public Library by the Editor in connection with the editing of the current Emu.

From a newspaper cutting received from Major H. M. Whittell, R.A.O.U., it appears that following the introduction of fifty "cattle egret birds"\* from India into England to combat flies and ticks at Whipsnade Zoo, numbers of the birds are to be liberated in the West Kimberley district of north-west Australia, in the hope that they will prove useful to cattle owners in the eradication of ticks and buffalo flies.

A pair is to be confined in the South Perth Zoo. The Curator of the Museum (Mr. L. Glauert), whilst cautiously urging care in connection with all introductions, suggested that nothing but good should result from the above proposal.

## Report of Bird Observers Club

At the annual meeting held on March 27 much discussion centred around the recent exhibition, which proved a success financially, as well as in the general interest it aroused. It was decided to make the exhibition an annual institution, and to use the funds so obtained

for the furtherance of this movement.

The Leach Memorial Club continues to function in co-operation with

the Bird Observers by arranging the monthly outings. Last year's timerary covered over 700 miles.

The attractions of Anthony's Crossing, on Djerriwarrah Creek, Bacchus Marsh road, drew a large attendance. The picturesque valley. 150 feet below the plain, has the makings of a fine park. Upstream, still in unspoiled condition, is the area which a writer described, some years ago, as the best all-round collecting ground near Melbourne for the naturalist.
