

*P. turtur's* breeding range is from a little south of the sub-tropical Convergence to a good deal north of it: it is thus the only Prion breeding in the sub-tropics. From the little known of *salvini* it seems to breed centrally in the zone between the two Convergences.

It is doubtful whether a discussion of distribution based on breeding places alone is very profitable, for Prions are birds of easily-sustained flight and the accidental geographic location of the few islands where they can nest may be of less significance than their winter feeding range, of which so little is accurately known.

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**Western Silvereye.**—The Western Silvereye (*Zosterops australasiæ*) is particularly numerous in the extensive areas of scrub which clothe the sand-hills between Cottesloe and Waterman's Bay, Western Australia. Several nests containing eggs and young were found in that area during September, October and November of 1939, and, as a photograph of the species has not previously appeared in *The Emu*, I am forwarding one for publication.—S. R. WHITE, Perth, W.A., 20/5/40.
