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**Fairy Martins Repairing Damaged Nests.**—I was interested in A. R. McGill's account of Fairy Martins (*Hylochelidon ariel*) that discontinued nest construction when the mud dried up in the vicinity of the chosen nesting site (*Emu*, vol. 44, p. 320). The birds apparently did not search further afield for suitable material. The Fairy Martins I mentioned in my article 'Unorthodox Nesting Sites' (*Emu*, vol. 44, p. 234) that repaired damaged nests, flew a quarter of a mile distance to obtain the material. All nests examined contained either young or eggs. That, perhaps, spurred the owners of partly-destroyed nests to greater efforts, and to fly longer distances than is usual, with mud pellets with which to repair their little homes and save the young therein.—LAWRENCE C.
