File S1. Interview topic guide for healthcare providers

Opening Questions

- 1. Just to start with, could you tell me how often you see patients from Chinese background, for example, how many times a week or a month or a year?
- 2. As for Chinese women, what do you see as the most common reasons for visiting your practice?
- 3. (if contraception not mentioned), how common is consultation regarding contraception among Chinese women who visit your practice?
- 4. Can you provide a general profile of Chinese women who access contraceptive consultations at your practice? (such as age group, marital status, education, occupation, country of origin or anything that you can think of?)
- 5. Can you describe your general experience in providing contraception consultations with Chinese women?
 - What is the most common problems that are discussed?
 - What is usually involved?
 - How comfortable they are when discussing contraception with you?
- 6. Do you think there is a preference for a method among women from Chinese background compared to women from other backgrounds? What could be the reasons?

Knowledge

- 1. What do you see as the main options they have?
- 2. What do you see as the main advantages and disadvantages of those options?
- 3. What do you see as the main advantages and disadvantages of those options from the perspectives of Chinese women?

Values

- 4. When making contraception decisions with your Chinese patients, what contraceptive features matters most to you about those options?
- 5. From your experience, what do you think matters most to Chinese women about those options and their advantages and disadvantages?

Decisional Conflict

- 6. Let's talk about the difficulties Chinese women may have making this decision about contraception. How do you describe the general feelings of Chinese women when faced with choosing a contraceptive method?
 - How do you describe their confidence in making contraception decisions? Why? Do you think it may differ across different age groups, residence status and marital status?
 - How do they feel when they are presented with more than on options available?
 - Did you find any negative feelings among Chinese women when deciding on contraception, such as worry, anxiety, pressure or others?
- 7. What do you think makes the decision about contraception difficult for Chinese women?
 - How do you describe their ease in getting information about contraception options,
 benefits and risks? Why? Why not?
 - How do you describe their ability in comprehending information about options, benefits and risks? Why?
 - How did you feel about their personal skills in making the decision? Why?
 - Do you think there are pressure from others for Chinese women when making decisions about contraception?
